The concert is designed as an uninterrupted sequence, mixing recorded sound, live sound and visuals.

Kintsugi is the Japanese art of repairing broken pottery with lacquer dusted with gold, beautifying the breakage and making it a part of the object's history, more precious than it was before.

In this concert, designed as a taster and prelude to a full iteration of the Occupy The Pianos Festival next year, Hind, Lixenberg and Balmazi-Owen, design and describe a personal journey through some of the preoccupations the future festival will dwell on: migrations - of humans, of birds and animals.

The time and mood of lockdown is also reflected in fierce and angry music, ruminative music, and especially the increased awareness of our relationship with nature (Schumann and Hindley.) In an uninterrupted 90 minute sequence these moods are examined and played out, with sound and film to complement and comment on the journey.

As ever with Occupy there's a bracing mix of brand new, with premieres from Hind, Willis and Mitchener; little-performed - Koechlin's astonishing piano pieces from the 1910s, for example – and classics in a new context: songs from Schumann whose direct yet mysterious Eichendorff texts encapsulate Man's age old fascination, horror and intoxication with the natural world.

Come and join us for this cathartic sequence that opens with the sound of a mythical bird, and ends with the audience creating the sounds, as we remind ourselves of the beauty, outrage, and outrageous beauty of music.



Eichendorff - In a Castle

Up there at his look-out
The old knight has fallen asleep;
Rain-storms pass overhead,
And the wood stirs through the portcullis.
Beard and hair matted together,
Ruff and breast turned to stone,
For centuries he's sat up there
In his silent cell.
Outside it's quiet and peaceful,
All have gone down to the valley,
Forest birds sing lonely songs
In the empty window-arches.

A wedding-party's sailing by,

Rolf Hind's career has established him as a major force as soloist, composer, recording artist, chamber musician, pedagogue, collaborator and concert planner. He has given recitals at many of Europe's leading new music festivals, and at Carnegie Hall, Sydney Opera House and on tours of Korea, Taiwan and Cuba.

Rolf has worked with many leading conductors, including Ashkenazy, Knussen, Rattle, David Robertson and Andrew Davis and appeared seven times at the BBC Proms. Orchestras he has worked with include the Chamber Orchestra of Europe, Munich Philharmonic, Danish Radio Symphony Orchestra, Malmö Symphony, and Baltimore Symphony Orchestra, many appearances with the London Sinfonietta, the LPO, RPO, and with all the BBC orchestras.

Composers who have worked with Rolf or written for him include Tan Dun, John Adams, Helmut Lachenmann, Unsuk Chin, Elliott Carter, George Benjamin and James MacMillan. Rolf's compositions include a piano concerto, Maya-Sesha (nominated for a British Composer's Award) and a concerto for accordion, premiered at London's Barbican Centre. Much of his music is inspired by India, where he travels often, while drawing on the technical adventurousness of performers including himself.

An interest in new dance has resulted in collaborations including with choreographer Rui Horta on a large-scale tour of a new work, Danza Preparata, featuring John Cage's Sonatas and Interludes for prepared piano, with dancer.

Rolf curates and performs in Occupy The Pianos, a new piano festival which has become a regular feature at St John's Smith Square in London. The festival now enters its sixth iteration, having also travelled to France and in future to Denmark. He initiated a project in March 2020 which has now produced nearly 100 new short piano pieces from composers far and wide, intended as responses to lockdown, a fascinating range of pieces which he is now including in recital.

His first opera, Lost in Thought, a 'Mindfulness opera' commissioned by Mahogany Opera Group was premiered at The Barbican in London. Current composition plans include a major new piece commissioned by the BBC Singers and featuring Robin Michael, cello, plus an operatic project about the poet Sufi Rumi, working with Rolf's long-time collaborator Frederick Wake-Walker and the Anglo-US poet Dante Michaeux.



A former Theatre de Complicite performer, and alongside a formal vocal and composition training, Loré Lixenberg also performed in stand-up as 'The Opera Device' in Kluuub Zarathstra with Stewart Lee and Simon Munnery. She's sung work by a host of contemporary composers (Rolf Hind, Georges Aperghis, Bent Sørensen, Helmut Oehring, Mark-Anthony Turnage, Karen Power, György Ligeti, Karlheinz Stockhausen. Beat Furrer. Harrison Birtwistle. Peter Maxwell Davies. Earle Brown, Luc Ferrari, Frederic Acquaviva Pauline Oliveros and Gerald Barry), often working closely with the composers themselves also performing with artists Sam Belinfante, STELARC, Bruce Mclean, ORLAN, Squib Box (Neil Luck/Adam de la Cour/Federico Reuben) and David Toop. Lixenbergs' own compositions reflect her obsession with organic participatory

principles, new technologies and structures found in the natural history and include BIRD, SINGLR, Adipose, Innanacara among others, she is a Phd student at York studying with Federico Reuben. Since the start of 2018, she's declared her whole life to be "an extension of her voice and singing practice... therefore to be considered an extended vocal." She runs La Plaque Tournante with composer Frederic Acquaviva.



Sasha Balmazi-Owen is a Russian-Welsh film & theatre maker. His recent credits include the film 'Steel to Smoke' for Nonclassical with Yfat Soul Zisso, and collaboration 'Physical Education' for BCMG with Robert Reid Allan, as well as the opera film 'Death Visits Mererid' for Random Acts. He has also worked with Institute of Contemporary Art, Copenhagen Opera House, Mahogany Opera Group, David Toop, Richard Court, Jonathan Goddard and Zoë Martlew. He has collaborated with Rolf Hind and Loré Lixenberg since 2015, fusing opera, music and film.
