Featured performer Lixenberg directs sections from Kagel's groundbreaking work with amateur performers from CoMA in a version tailored to St John's Smith Square's space. Unmissable! This is preceded by Rolf Hind's *Way Out East*, written for Lixenberg. A cautiously loving tribute to India, it comprises settings of a fever-induced Haiku penned by the composer, and an online essay that seems to have been through Google Translate and back, yet still glows with love for the country's most revered animal, while the music resonates with the violence enacted upon it.

Two further pieces act as focuses for meditation – firstly on sound and then in a walking meditation in which the audience will be invited to take part.

Taking its title from Rilke, Per Nørgård's astonishing two-piano piece opens into a chaotic and joyous embrace of wild, colourful and rhythmic sounds. After this, the concert becomes more contemplative and the audience shares in the music-making with Pauline Oliveros' work. After the interval a coda of luminous delicacy in pieces by Feldman, Harvey and Scelsi, leading the audience and the players towards the final event of the night...
